Reverend Helen writes:

At the beginning of June I will be having surgery on my right big toe! Not something I'm particularly looking forward to, although I count myself extremely lucky that I have been offered a procedure that should improve my mobility and reduce the pain of creaking joints that many have to live with!

For the first couple of weeks, until the dressings are removed, I will be mostly off my feet and I am sure (metaphorically at least) climbing the walls because I won't be able to do what I want to do!

This of course is a familiar situation for many people in our parishes. Whether through frail health or disability, many are unable to do the things they would dearly love to do.



The 'Warkworth' Otters

After weeks of uncorroborated sightings from Amble to the Hermitage at Warkworth, and some controversy over what these elusive creatures might be, the answer was resolved by local photographer Ray Sheils. On an early morning dog walk in late April he was able to capture these images at the maximum of his camera's zoom range: a family of one mother and three cub otters on the river Coquet!

Since April, Ray has been joined by several other keen local photographers including Richard Booth, who has provided the following photos. These help document this little family over several very early morning encounters showing that the three cubs have grown in size and curiosity.

British otters are in fact European otters (*Lutra lutra*) and are mainly solitary creatures. They are members of the weasel family and the only truly aquatic species of this group. They feed mainly of fish but will feed on a variety of other foods if fish are scarce. Females have

very large territories of 30+kms of river bank, while males' territories are vast and will include several females' territories.

Otters live in 'holts' which can be burrows or natural spaces and they will have several

holts across their territories.

Males do not bond after mating and generally move away leaving the female to bring up the cubs alone. Males can be aggressive to cubs that are not their own, so mothers have to be very protective and will move cubs regularly around her various holts. As such, family groups like this can appear to be quite transient in any particular location.

The cubs are dependant on their mothers for 12 months and will spend up to 15 months with them before moving away to set up their own territories.



Footnote: The otter family have not been seen since mid May, so may have now moved to another holt further upstream.

The last month has again proved to be a busy and active time for Amble and Warkworth Rotarians.

On Saturday the 10th of May, nine members and friends participated in the Hadrian's Wall Walk in aid of Rotary's 'End Polio Now' campaign. We participated with a team from Alnwick



Rotary and walked the five-and-a-half-mile section from Brocolitia to Housteads fort following the course of the Roman wall. I am happy to report that the task was completed within the three-hour deadline. Whilst the aim was to raise funds for a very worthy cause the event proved to a very enjoyable one, with stunning views, interesting archaeology, and good company.



Following in the outdoor theme, RAW members also enjoyed an interesting after dinner talk by Leigh Venus on the Kielder Observatory. The talk was illustrated with some stunning night skies shots as Leigh highlighted the work undertaken by the observatory's staff and volunteers.

On the social front, Bill McClement was crowned this year's champion at the recent RAW pub games event held at the Hermitage Inn.

We have been fortunate to have been joined by new members. Graeme Popay was inducted into RAW at the end of April.



ACKLINGTON HISTORY SLOT

Black Ralph



Every community has its fair share of interesting and exceptional characters (whether past or present) who, for whatever reason, stand out from the crowd.

Acklington is no exception and in this month's history slot I would like to tell you about a prominent parishioner who was born in 1814 - none other than the legendary former village blacksmith Ralph Potts.

Ralph was a big powerful blacksmith and farrier with a mass of black hair and a bushy black beard. Villagers nickname him 'Black Ralph'. Ralph was a very intelligent, fearless and deeply religious man. He was a fine craftsman and was respected by all. He had three blacksmiths shops in the area but lived in the big Smithy House in Acklington at the junction of Morwick Road. The Old Smithy buildings still stand today but it is now a private residence.

As a leading member of the community Ralph would often be called upon to deal with troublesome drunks and intervene in domestic disturbances. It was said he could knock a man over as if he were a nine pin. Village mothers would frighten their children by saying "If you don't behave I'll send for Black Ralph mind!" As well as shoeing horses and mending farm implements he treated sick animals and was asked to treat sick and injured villagers too. He was noted for his herbal potions which he would make up in the kitchen from wild plants. He invented a pedal digging spade and made sets of extraction pliers in his shop to take out bad teeth in humans as well as horses.

Ralph was a bold man and would stand up to the farmers and squires. He once ordered the Duke of Northumberland off the property even though the Duke was the landlord! As master of his own house and set in his ways he would retire to his bedroom at 9.00 p.m. to pray and would rise at 5.00 a.m. to read the scriptures, however cold the morning was. He held services in the front room of the Smithy in the days before Acklington Church was built. Each Sunday morning he would walk to church in Amble and the family were not allowed to sit down to dinner until his return.

Ralph was instrumental in galvanising and leading a group of residents to request their own church in the mid 1800's. Queen Victoria was petitioned and it is said that the queen, at first, was not in favour of the idea. However, when she heard that Ralph Potts was planning to give her a visit, she changed her mind and agreed to the request in 1859.

One tale that survives shows the character of Black Ralph. Two men brought a mule to be shod at the smithy and said they would leave the animal with him and went off to the mart smiling as they expected him to have extreme trouble with this difficult mule. On their return they were surprised to find the mule, with new shoes fitted, tethered outside the blacksmith's shop. Ralph had clamped the animal's ear in the vice and was able to continue the job with a very restrained mule.

Ralph's mother was apparently a waif of the sea. She floated ashore, dressed in fine clothes, in her cradle from a ship that went down with all hands on Boulmer Sands. No-one knew her identity or nationality but she grew into a small dark eyed, dark skinned woman. It was said that she had magical fingers and could make amazing things with her hands. It appears she had ten children – one, of course, being Ralph Potts.

Ralph's wife Rachael died aged 74 and was buried in Acklington churchyard in 1887. Ralph made an iron grave head in her memory and some years later he joined her but of course his name could not be added to the ironwork.

Pictured below is an old grainy photograph of the man himself during his latter years when his hair and beard had both turned white. Plus photographs of the grave head (it can't be called a gravestone as it is not made of stone) which still today stands proudly in Acklington churchyard. This fine grave head is the only one of its kind in any churchyard or cemetery anywhere. It is totally unique like the Acklington parishioner 'Black Ralph' who created it.

Warkworth History Society May


On Monday 12th May, following a brief AGM, Moira Kilkenny introduced a talk on 'Angels of the North Volume 2', a collection of essays on notable women of the North East which she has co-written with Joyce Quin.

Joyce then went on to talk in detail about some of these women who, while not necessarily being famous, have nevertheless made substantial contributions in their particular fields.

The earliest entry concerns two female servants

who, in 1417, dressed as men to gain access to St Cuthbert's tomb at Durham Cathedral, a place from which women were traditionally barred. And the most recent entry is Dame Rosemary Cramp, a leading expert in Anglo-Saxon and early medieval archaeology at Durham University, who died as recently as 2023.

The definition of the North East was occasionally stretched. The philosopher Mary Midgley, for example, grew up in London and went to Oxford University. But she then married a man from Newcastle and lived there for 59 years until she died in Jesmond at the age of 99. Hannah Hauxwell, the star of several TV documentaries, was known as a Yorkshire farmer, but her farm in the north Pennines was officially in County Durham.



One of the most local northern women to appear in the book is Bella Reay from Blyth, known as 'Wor Bella', who was a munitionette in the First World War, when women were called on to work in the munitions factories while the men were away fighting. She introduced women's football matches as a means of exercise for her fellow workers, and to raise money for the soldiers fighting on the front. She played for Blyth Spartans when they won the Munitions Cup, scoring four goals in the final.

Many of the women who appear in the book were from wealthy or middle class backgrounds. But the working classes are also represented. Elizabeth Shepherd was brought up on Coquet Island and later lived in Amble with her husband, a miner. When he

was injured and unable to work, with no compensation, Elizabeth had to find a way to provide for her family. She did this by making quilts and was very successful. One of her quilts is on display at the Beamish Museum, and another at the British Museum in London. The list goes on, totalling 35 amazing women from the North East who must surely serve as an inspiration to us all.




