Reverend Helen writes:

This month I'd like to give a shout out to all who look after our churchyards and cemeteries across the benefice. If you haven't visited them recently I would thoroughly recommend a walk around any or all of them. Each has its own charm, and they are places of great peace and tranquillity as well as sacred space where loved ones memories are cherished.

Each of our three churches have invested time and resources to improve the natural environment, enabling grasses and flowers to seed in certain areas and planting to encourage pollinators as well as maintaining attractive borders. With the help of people within the wider community as well as the church we have restored benches and pathways so that the far corners of these natural spaces can be enjoyed by all.

Acklington's churchyard has beautiful wide open views on the south side. Do take a walk around to the back of the church. There you will find a rare example of an iron headstone to the memory Rachel wife of the blacksmith Ralph Potts. Thanks to those who manage the borders and trim around the headstones.

Shilbottle has a Green Team who have, over the course of the last few years, cleared and planted the area to the northwest of the church which suffered from storm damage making it an area for quiet reflection. They have also engaged the school and wider community in a number of special planting events which has led to a significant increase in the number of plant species identified. The churchyard runs into the civic cemetery, which is where burials currently take place.

Warkworth has a team who manage the beautiful churchyard borders and Green Matters work with the parish and county councils to manage the cutting of the grass to encourage greater plant diversity. The current cemetery is on the north side of Beach Road at the brow of the hill, and thanks to the efforts of a number of individuals, alongside the support of the parish council, this is a really beautiful space to visit. There is a bench at the southwest corner of the old cemetery which looks out over the whole village. Deer are often to be found grazing amongst the graves - unfortunately they have a particular fondness for the heads of cut roses!

My thanks to our parish councils and volunteers for their support and for all who are able to care for their family graves.

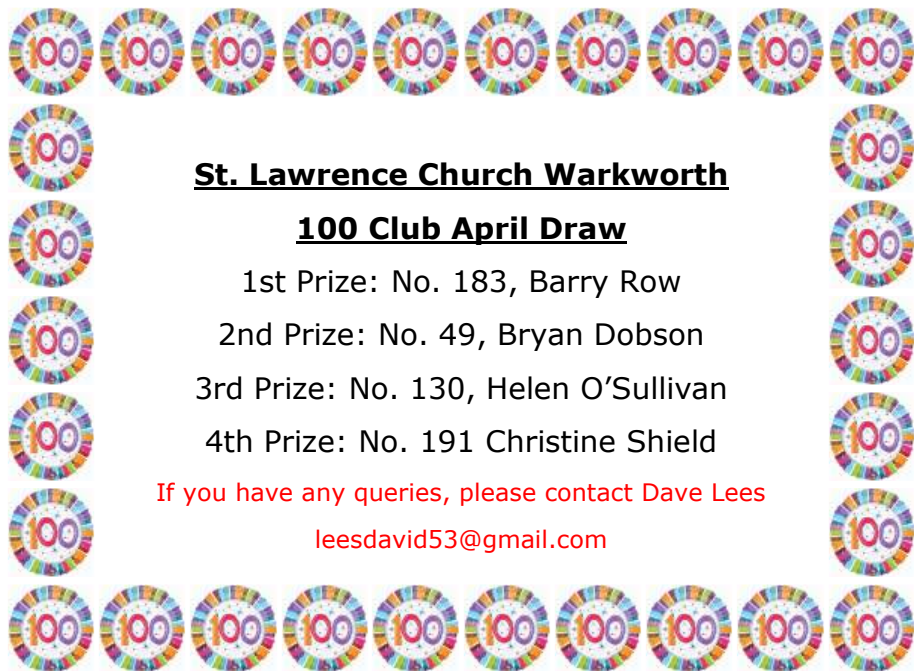

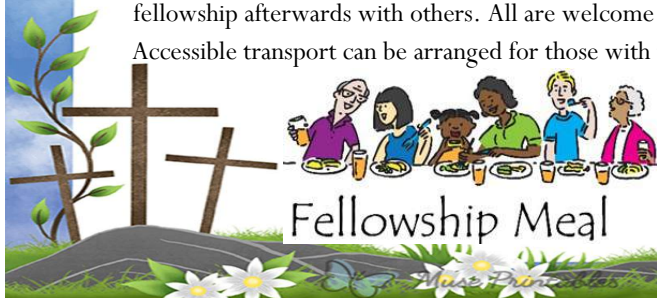


FELLOWSHIP COMMUNION SERVICE (WITH HYMNS)

Next month we will start planting out summer bedding in various locations. Our main supplier this year will be HMP Northumberland and we are grateful for their support.



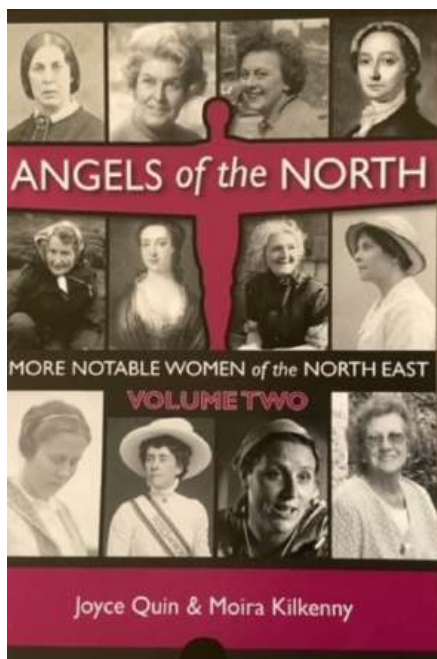

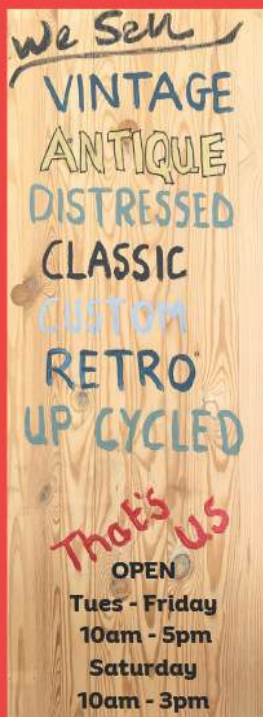

Rotary update April 2025

Spring commenced with a beautiful display of purple (and white) crocuses along the riverside verge of Rotary Way between Warkworth and Amble. The wild daffodils planted on the other side of the road are also providing another dazzling display this month, as are the daffodils also planted along the track outside Warkworth cricket club. These displays are the result of several years of hard work by local Rotarians planting thousands of bulbs along the road verge.

Rotarians and their guests recently enjoyed a fun social event involving an escape room challenge in Morpeth! Members were divided into teams who then attempted one of the three challenges on offer, The Matter of the Hatter, The Stolen Magic and Murder on the Morpeth Express. These games involved a number of mental challenges to unlock boxes and doors with the ultimate aim of escaping the game and beating the 60-minute deadline. Whist no team managed to escape and beat the clock; one team did manage to complete the game albeit missing the deadline by only three minutes. The evening was rounded off with an excellent Indian meal at the Manzil restaurant.



We also welcomed Warkworth resident Graeme Popay who gave an after dinner talk on the Alnmouth Sea Scouts.



More recently, Dr Paul Morrison gave us a talk about the history of Coquet Island and his own involvement over many years in protecting the unique bird life that visit this island.

In addition to the above events Amble and Warkworth Rotary members also volunteered to assist at the Shortridge Hall open gardens event on Saturday the 5th of April. The event is part of the National Gardens Scheme with raised money going to local charities in the Northeast.

Looking ahead, planned events include a pub games evening on the 15th April, as well as a talk about the Kielder Observatory later at the end of that month.

Be a GROWER, not a mower.

Many of you would have seen the Butterfly Conservation on the BBC1 news a few weeks ago. They were launching their **‘Grow not Mow’** campaign, raising awareness of the plight of our insect populations. Butterflies and moths are sensitive indicators of the health of our environment. Sadly, 2024 saw the worst year on record for butterflies, and a **Butterfly Emergency** was declared. Over half of our species are in long-term decline.



How you can help – research has shown that leaving your garden to grow wild with long grass increases butterfly numbers by up to 93%. They need long grass to complete their full life cycles. If you don't mow from April to September, you are providing them with a perfect environment to flourish. Anyone with a garden they don't use much, or a patch that can be left alone, will be helping not only butterflies and moths, but a whole host of other insects.

Rise to the challenge - **‘Grow, not mow.’**

Coquet River Action Group Update

CRAG Little Shore Group has been formed to deliver a community driven campaign, working alongside the Harbour Commission and aimed at gaining **‘Bathing Water Status’** (BWS) for Amble Little Shore. BWS has its origins in the EU Bathing Water Directive first introduced in 1976. Warkworth and Amble Links beaches are both already designated BWS. The Little Shore would ensure this popular bathing place, affected by the river and the sea, would join them .

BWS is one of the best ways to protect a river, ensuring regular testing, investigation of pollution incidents and a plan to improve water quality. Part of our campaign is talking to the



community and encouraging the completion of a questionnaire looking at how often the beach is visited and used. The questionnaire will be available on line from the 13th May at coquetriverractiongroup.org , also in paper copy around Town. We will be at the Puffin Festival on Saturday the 24th of May and we will be holding meetings during the bathing season.

Our regular Citizen Science Testing is continuing in both Warkworth and Amble for the next year. New sites will be covered and new tests including Bacterial enterococci are included. WARSWORTH FILM CLUB

Saturday May 3rd –The Edge of the World and Return to the Edge of the World

We like to bring you a wide range of films and this month's movie is a British classic. There will be a short introductory talk before the film and a brief interval before the shorter second film is shown.

The Edge of the World is a 1937 British film directed by Michael Powell, loosely based on the evacuation of the Scottish archipelago of St Kilda. It was Powell's first major project. The film tells the poignant story of the depopulation of one of the isolated outer islands of Scotland as, one by one, the younger generation leaves for the greater opportunities offered by the mainland, making it harder to follow the old ways of life there. Powell gathered together a cast and crew who were willing to take part in an expedition to what was a very isolated part of the UK. They had to build their own accommodation and stay there for several months; finishing up with a film which not only tells a compelling story, but also captures the raw natural beauty of the location. Return to the Edge of the World (1978) is a 22 minute BBC documentary In which Michael Powell and some of the surviving cast and crew return to Foula to re-visit the island where they made the film that changed their lives.

Saturday July 12th – A Real Pain

A Real Pain is a 2024 comedy-drama film written and directed by Jesse Eisenberg; the film stars Eisenberg and Kieran Culkin as mismatched cousins who reunite for a Jewish heritage tour through Poland in honour of their late grandmother, but their old tensions resurface against the backdrop of their family history Led by a scene-stealing turn from Kieran Culkin, who won both an Oscar and a BAFTA for this role, A Real Pain is a powerfully funny, emotionally resonant dramedy that finds writer-director-star Jesse Eisenberg playing to his strengths on either side of the camera. The beautiful score is almost entirely composed of piano pieces by Frederic Chopin. (cert 15, 1h 39').

Please note that we are taking a little break in June and the July film is on the second, rather than the first, Saturday of the month.

Remembering RAF Acklington



At the beginning of the Second World War, RAF Acklington was the most important fighter station in north-east England. It started life in 1938 as a training base for RAF aircrew, but after the outbreak of hostilities it was hastily converted to a fighter station and given the role of protecting the skies over Newcastle and the surrounding area.

Acklington's Spitfires and Hurricanes were soon in action against German bombers as many of the earliest air raids of the war took place over this part of Britain. Due to the importance of this region, with its major ports and industries, it continued to attract the attention of enemy bombers long after the Battle of Britain had been won.

By late 1940, most of the attacks took place after dark and so RAF Acklington hosted night fighter squadrons. Unlike many military airfields it did not close when hostilities ceased; it reverted to its original role as a training facility with a brief spell as a Fighter Command base in the late 1950s until its closure a decade later.

Today, of course, there is little sign that there once was an airfield at Acklington. The runways have been ripped up and HMP Northumberland now stands on the site of the old military air base. However, we should never forget the pivotal role that RAF Acklington played in the Second World War so I was delighted to learn that, on **Sat 10th May**, a member of the Airfields of Britain Conservation Trust will be unveiling a 1.2m high solid granite monument as a memorial to RAF Acklington. The memorial will be on the roundabout as you enter the prison grounds and will be unveiled at **2.00pm**. Everyone is welcome so do please come along if you possibly can.

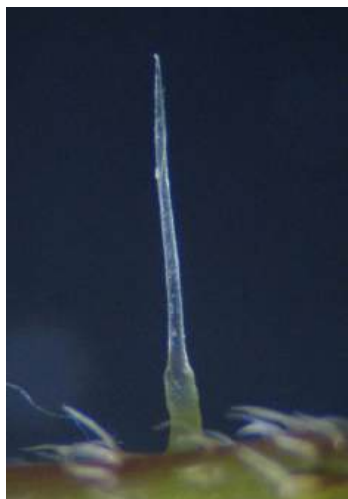
Spring Is Sprung And So Are The Stinging Nettles!



As the myriad of plants are springing back into life around the village so are some of the less welcome blooms with 'stinging nettles' being one of the least popular.

The stinging nettle, *Urtica dioica*, earns its name from its capacity to deliver an irritating sting by way of tiny hairs on their leaves and stems. These stinging cells, called Trichomes, have developed

hollow hairs made of silica which break on contact resulting in a jagged edge which sticks into the skin of the hapless victim. This in turn allows the release of a cocktail of irritants which include formic acid, histamine, acetylcholine and serotonin. Although the levels of these irritants is low, it is thought that the compounds in combination are very virulent.



A popular belief is that rubbing affected areas with a Dock Leaf (*Rumex obtusifolius*) is an effective remedy due to its neutralising alkaline action. However, the sap of dock leaves is also acidic so this is not a likely scenario. It may be that Dock Leaves have a cooling and soothing effect or contain a natural anti-histamine but there is no evidence that this is the case.

The proven treatment for nettle stings is an anti-histamine or corticosteroid cream which will reduce the inflammation and pain.

Warkworth History Society April

This month we welcomed Liz Finch, National Trust volunteer, to speak on 'The Rise and Fall and Rise Again of Seaton Delaval Hall'.

She explained that the Delavals originated from Normandy. They were gifted their land by William the Conqueror, a reward for their support at the Battle of Hastings. They made money from coal mining and salt panning, but exporting goods was difficult as boats could not navigate the river until Sir Ralph Delaval built a sluice system creating sufficient depth for boats coming up from the Tyne.

Sir Ralph became richer and married Diana Booth in 1677.

When Ralph died, his cousin, Sir John Delaval took over but was less successful, and when Diana remarried the money went with her. Another wealthy cousin, Admiral George Delaval, came to the rescue and employed Sir John Vanbrugh to rebuild the hall in 1718. Admiral George moved in, but died after falling from his horse in 1723 before building was complete. It now passed to Sir Francis Blake Delaval, an actor, soldier and MP. He married Rhoda Apreece, a wealthy heiress, and they had 12 children. At this point Seaton Delaval Hall was extended!

These children were known as the gay Delavals, famous for their wild parties. The eldest son, also Sir Francis, inherited in 1753. He was a womaniser, drunkard, gambler and a spendthrift. The family valuables had to be locked away for safety. The second son, John, was a good businessman and ran the Hall himself. In 1749, aged 21, Sir Francis married Isabella Powlett, a wealthy 54 year old widow. He outlived her and she died in poverty.

The Delavals held lavish parties and loved to play tricks on their guests. One was the 'upside down room', thought to have been achieved by the clever use of mirrors.

Sir Francis died in 1771 and Lord John Hussey Delaval became the legitimate owner. His daughter, Sarah Hussey Delaval, with something of a reputation, was the original 'Brazen Hussey'! Lord John's younger brother Robert built a 'cut' to the North Sea, increasing trade massively. John's only son, Jack, died of TB aged 19 and was the last of the Delavals.

In 1822 fire destroyed the central block. Sir Jacob Astley, its then owner, employed architect John Dobson to rebuild most of the original building. The Astleys lived there until 2007. The National Trust took ownership in 2009 and have since been involved in extensive repairs and conservation work to Hall and gardens.

Warkworth Memorial Hall



There is no Hall arranged music concert in May, but we have a welcome return of Tom McConville (fiddle) and Andy Watt (guitar and mandolin) on the 20th June. This promises to be an entertaining evening of song, music and friendly banter. The hall has been privately booked for a Chris Wood concert on the 10th May. You'll find detail of this and our future concerts on the Hall's website - wwwmh.uk.

The "2nd Monday of the month" afternoon music and song session will not be taking place in May. The next one is scheduled for 2pm on the 9th June. We'll then make a decision on whether or not these are to run over the summer months.

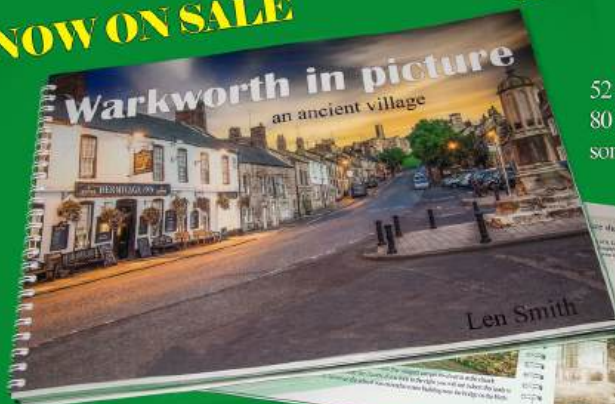
