Revd Helen writes;

I am going to risk causing offence, I really do hope I don't, it is not my intention!
Why not give church a go...

People often tell me they don't go to church (and by *go to church* I mean to services) because they find God elsewhere. I don't doubt that for a moment, God is obviously not confined to church.

Other people tell me that they find church difficult for all sorts of reasons; often past experience. That's such a travesty that an encounter with 'church' should ever be so bad that it puts someone off altogether!

Some people say that they just don't feel it's *for them*. This can be especially true in rural communities where going or not going to church can be a bit of a statement as to where or how we belong or don't within a particular community, or faction *within* a community. We may or may not be a joiner of things, or want to feel obligated to a particular group.

You'll have heard it said that 'Hell is other people' well, so is Heaven!

A healthy church (and I certainly don't think ours are unhealthy) is a place where everyone and anyone should feel *at home*. Where everyone is welcome regardless of what they may or may not have to offer; a community in which everyone feels that they grow. Absolutely not a community of like minded people, but of people who share the same hope. Churches are unique communities bringing together people of different ages, backgrounds and experience.

I know there are a good number of people who regularly come into church when it's quiet to offer a prayer or light a candle or just sit and reflect and that's a lovely thing to do and I'm not knocking that...and I would say this wouldn't I, there is also something in *corporate worship* that you simply can't get anywhere else and I believe it's worth an hour (or half an hour midweek) of your time, even if you are totally sceptical about it all.

Why not take another look at what's on offer across the three churches, there really is something for everyone (traditional, modern, ritualistic, contemplative, said and sung), and if you don't find what you think you are looking for please do give me a shout, maybe a conversation with myself or another member of the ministry team might be helpful. There are even on-line and telephone services for those unable to get out.

At the end of July, we were lucky enough to take advantage of a free workshop. Blair from Stronger Shores gave us a short talk on their latest sea grass project which was followed by a fun-filled acrylic session, led by Luke McTaggart, where we painted seafood and fish. It was great-if somewhat smelly!

The day before, a group of local artists and writers, including several of our group headed up to Lindisfarne. What a lovely day we had! We began our day with half an hour on the Pilgrim's Way where we first met Blair from Stronger Shores who introduced us to the seagrass.

It turns out that seagrass, whilst able to store carbon, create oxygen and provide homes for wildlife, can also play a huge part in stabilising our shores and preventing erosion. Blair explained the vital role that Stronger Shores are playing to try to re-establish the seagrass in the north-east. It is an unprepossessing plant but one that could make a huge impact in the future.

Following lunch, we headed off to the other side of the island where Katherine Renton and Luke set us off with some sketching. It was an idyllic setting with amazing weather. All in all, a very pleasant day out. Thanks to Luke, Katherine and Blair for making both the trip and the workshop happen.

We start back to our regular Thursday sessions in September which we will look forward to after our break.

Rotary update August 2025

Amble and Warkworth Rotary

July and early August has seen a good mixture of social and community-based work by local Rotarians.

On Tuesday 15th July, Peter from Northumberland Northumbria Blood Bikes met with Rotarians at Warkworth Cricket Club. A grand buffet supper was followed by a demonstration of the outstanding and committed voluntary service they provide to our community. These individuals are carrying emergency blood and related products, between hospitals and to the helicopters of the GNAAS between 7.00pm and 7.00am 365 days a year. Since their beginnings in 2014 they have completed over 120,000 deliveries. President Trevor Robertson is pictured reliving his boyhood dreams of riding a powerful motorbike.



On Tuesday 5th August RAW ran a Warkworth village Treasure Hunt consisting of several teams who started off from The Hermitage Inn following the list of cryptic clues around the village before ending the evening with a BBQ at the Cricket club. Ann Burke, chair of the Warkworth Parish Council received the treasure chest

as captain of the winning team.

Two of our young people from JCS College have completed the Rotary Youth Leadership Awards at the RYLA camp in Baldersdale in the wilds of Teesdale. Congratulations to William and Grace who successfully completed the challenging programme, and we look forward to them attending a future meeting to tell us about their experience at RYLA.

Members also recently enjoyed an after-dinner presentation by local Rotarian Alun Morgan on the Aquabox scheme. This project was started by Wirksworth Rotary club in Derbyshire in 1992 in response to various disasters around the world. It has evolved into volunteer-based operation which assembles and distributes pumps which filter dirty water into safe drinking water. These pumps are packed into plastic boxes along with a variety of tools and are ready to be distributed across the world in response to natural and made disasters.



The Aquaboxes are distributed by local Rotary clubs in the affected areas. Alan is an ambassador for the Aquabox charity so spoke about the life saving filter pumps with some passion. His talk included a demonstration of him drinking a cup of contaminated water which had had been filtered via an Aquabox pump. Alan will be bringing one of the pumps to the Rotary stand at

the Warkworth show to highlight the life saving properties of the pump as well as highlight the work of the Aquabox organisation.

Local Rotarians will be supporting other local organisations in their work over August, in particular organising and running the car parking at the Warkworth Show on 16th August. In addition to managing the car parking, members will also have a Rotary stand highlighting the work of the organisation as well as selling wildflower plants to raise funds for local charitable causes.

Rotarians will be busy again on the August bank holiday weekend at the Red Row vintage club rally at Druridge Bay Country Park, running a Rotary fund-raising stand as well as assisting with the marshalling and clear up at the end of the show.

At the end of the month Rotarians are looking forward to a Hog Roast summer event hosted by Rotarians Mike and Rachael Wyllie at Shortridge Hall.

Coming soon is the RAW Charity Golf Day will be held at Alnmouth Golf Club (Foxton Hall) on Thursday 25th September 2025. 8 facts about the swift

- **Speed**- can fly up to 111km/h or 69MPH
- **Habitat**- spend 10 months continuously air-bourn- sleep, eat, drink and mate on the wing
- **Social**- screaming parties in the air in the summer months
- **Diet**- Insectivorous diet – flying insects and spiders
- **Nest** – in buildings, cliffs, old chimneys- glue nest materials together with saliva.
- **Extremely short legs**- only used for clinging on to vertical surfaces.
- **Migratory**- Fly from sub-Saharan Africa to Europe to mate. 14,000 miles every year- lifetime 2 million miles.
- **Related to** - hummingbirds not Swallows & Martins.

Fatal Attraction

Artificial lights are not good for insects

As Autumn approaches and the nights get darker much earlier, it is tempting to string up fairy lights or use other light sources around your house and garden. Before you do so, please be aware that light pollution is one of the main causes of insect decline. Light pollution from artificial lights at night (ALAN), has significant negative impacts on insect populations. It disrupts their behaviour, movement, predation, and ability to reproduce. Please do not use ALAN if you don't need to. Avoid outside bright lights, strings of lights and uplifter lights. As well as harming insects and other wildlife, they can also irritate your neighbours and those around you wanting a good night's sleep. Too much light pollution can constitute a '**statutory nuisance**' if it significantly interferes with the way someone uses and enjoys their property.

A biographical, psychological drama starring Angelina Jolie as opera singer Maria Callas, following the seven days before her death in Paris in 1977, as she reflects on her life and career. Jolie delivers an impressive performance as Callas as she succumbs to illness and loneliness. Maria broods over her medication and neglects to eat, and she is impossibly difficult with the servants, housekeeper Bruna (Alba Rohrwacher) and valet Ferruccio (Pierfrancesco Favino), who are the witnesses to her decline – and she is beginning to question the idea that she will ever sing again. The story is interspersed with hallucinatory flashbacks to the days of her celebrity pomp, but also further back to her childhood in Greece. (2024 cert 12, 2h 3').

Warkworth History Society

Warkworth History Society new programme commences on Monday 6th October 2025 at 7.30pm in Warkworth War Memorial Hall.

Our first lecture of the coming season is by playwright Ed Waugh, a champion of working-class histories, he has helped bring to the stage forgotten and entertaining stories of what he describes as “ordinary people doing extraordinary things”, from WWI female footballers and a miner-turned-champion rower, to a bard of Tyneside.

His talk will be on his latest play, *The Cramlington Train Wreckers*, which spotlights the true story of striking miners who ‘accidentally’ derailed the *Flying Scotsman* during the country’s national strike, almost a century ago.



Come along and listen to Ed share with us this local history about the infamous derailment which happened on 10th May 1926, seven days into the UK General Strike, when striking miners uncoupled a rail on the mainline Edinburgh to London railway with potentially catastrophic results.

What was the intentions of these Northumberland miners? Was it a desperate act of revolutionary terrorism or an act of protest that went wrong? 281 passengers were aboard the train at the time of the derailment; how many were killed or injured? Was the *Flying Scotsman* train severely damaged? How did the authorities respond to this incident? Where the perpetrators tracked down and caught and if so, what was their fate?

Ed has extensively researched this long-forgotten incident in the course of writing his play and will reveal more about this fascinating incident and the individuals involved in it. The session will be slightly longer than our normal lectures and will include some video clips recording the accounts of some of the protagonists involved in the incident. Come along and learn more.

Saturday 2nd August dawned bright and dry which was very encouraging to those who joined the community walk from St Lawrence to Alnmouth. Pre-walk refreshments in St Lawrence were much appreciated, and following a blessing from

Revd Helen we set out for an inland route, up Station Road and across the fields to Buston Barns. Various conversation about potato growing and potato crisps ensued! Gaining a little height as we came up to High Buston, we had glorious views out over the dunes and sparkling sea, and stopped for a while



simply to enjoy our surroundings. The path took us across to Wooden Farm from where we crossed back over the railway line, and across the A1067 to join the cycle route to Hipsburn. Once over the bridge at Alnmouth we swopped the road into the village for the enjoyable Lover's Lane along the estuary, giving us an chance to take in both the interesting buildings and the shore life along the way.

For three of us, following a visit to the Alnmouth Friary gardens for a Hospice Care tea, that involved a wonderfully contrasting walk back to Warkworth along the coast path and the beach.

Days such as this are a great reminder both of our good fortune in living in such a beautiful place, and of taking the opportunity to enjoy it in the company of others. Joined as we were by two or three from other parishes and from our wider community, various new connections were made. Thanks to all who joined in any way.

What of Ukraine?

Like many over the weekend 15- 17th of August I have been following, and hoping to make sense of the meeting in Alaska between presidents Trump and Putin over the future of Ukraine.

By the time you read this we will undoubtedly know more and be more aware of the effects that these so called negotiations will have on our local Ukrainian guests and their friends and colleagues across the free world who have sought sanctuary as well as those still at home in Ukraine (which hopefully will remain Ukraine).

We applaud the unity across Europe with Ukraine and hope that the efforts of our European leaders, which take place after writing this, will have some substantial affect upon the outcomes of further talks which must include Ukraine.

The helplessness for us is that we can have little effect on any peace agreement (I will not use the word “deal”) whilst it is being conducted by people with particular agendas and who hold a Veto against any decision they dislike at the UN Security Council.

So what can we do?

Our Ukrainian guests are in greater need now for support. We have with NCOS asked for meetings with our local MPs to find ways in which the future of our guest can be assured. We need to inform policy related to safe return if peace is agreed. But the potential of land grabs in Ukraine means that return may be to an area now controlled by the aggressor. We need the government to look at reasons for asylum where needed and even potential citizenship.

What about you? If you know or are aware of local guests, now is the time to offer friendship and support for them in such uncertain times. To ensure a peaceful environment without any problems that we know occur elsewhere in the country. Our friends from Ukraine need to feel especially safe at this time.

FROM THE PELICAN ARCHIVES

SEPTEMBER 2015

The parish Vicar was Revd. Michael Dent and The Pelican was a bumper issue of 52 pages which for the first time was in full colour, edited by David Charnock and Barbara King. The cover featured the Tour of Britain cycle race route which passed through Warkworth with a sprint section through the village and up the Castle Street hill.

The vicar's letter announced that Christine Shield had been ordained 'Reverend' and had become the new curate in the Benefice of Warkworth and Acklington.

On the social side, Warkworth hosted a coffee morning at St. Lawrence's Church, a Ceilidh Night with the "Reel Northumbria Ceilidh Band" at the Memorial Hall and Werca's Folk celebrated their 20th Anniversary at St. Lawrence's Church. Meanwhile in Acklington the Art group hosted a Macmillan Coffee Morning, there was a 'Beetle Drive' in aid of St. John the Divine Parish Church and a Curry and Quiz evening at the village hall.



On the community front, the Two Castles Housing Association and Esh had just completed the development at St. Oswalds Close and West Close. As a thank you to the community they presented a cheque

of £500 to Warkworth Cricket Club which was used to purchase of new kit for the Juniors team.

Acklington commemorated the 75th anniversary of the Battle of Britain with a 1940s Tea Party featuring film, fashion, food, music and memorabilia from the period.

Lesbury commemorated the 100th anniversary of the awarding of the

Victoria Cross to Daniel Laidlaw, 'the Piper of Loos' in the First World War. This included a parade featuring a 30 strong pipe and drum band and local military and cadet units.

Acklington also featured as a part of a commemorative tour of Britain in aid of

the RAF Benevolent Fund by Elizabeth Halls. Elizabeth was visiting the 60 airfields where her father had served driving "Chattie" a 1935 Singer Le Mans sports car similar to the one her father owned.
